










- Lucien Freud is a British artist.
- He was famous for painting portraits in an expressionist style and was challenging to people when it was first displayed.
 - His paintings were not like a photograph. He tried to emphasise the imperfections of the people that he painted.

- To draw a face, we need an egg shape.
- Then we draw a horizontal and vertical line. We will use these lines to place the features on the face




To create skin tones use these colours:










For darker skin tones mix red, blue and yellow and add white to create the shade.







Claude Monet 1840 - 1926



- Monet was a French artist and is considered one of the most important artists of all time.
 - He was the founder of the Impressionist movement the treatment of light and movement gives the impression of a scene, rather than a true representation of it.
- We can make secondary colours by mixing the primary colours.
- We can alter the tone of the colours by adding more or less of each colour, or lightening by adding white

- Monet is famous for landscapes, which he painted outside en plein air
- Monet was particularly inspired by his waterlily pond at his home in Giverny. He painted countless pictures of the pond over a 20 year period.

- Thorpe is an American artist who began life as a book illustrator, specialising in book covers
- His rocket paintings have become collectable in recent years
- Thorpe was always interested in science fiction and space
- His rocket paintings began as a way of using paint that was left over from a job, that would otherwise have to be thrown away.
- He used the paint to create abstract backgrounds, then added space-themed objects in the foreground.

Conceptual art is art for which the idea (or concept) behind the work is more important than the finished art object. It emerged as an art movement in the 1960s.

Henri Rousseau 1844 - 1910



- Rousseau was a French artist
- During his lifetime, people laughed at his work because he was self taught and it had a primitive style
- Although he painted jungles and creatures from other countries, he had never visited one and took inspiration from the botanical gardens of Paris, illustrations in children's books and a book about taxidermy of wild animals









Tiger in a Tropical Storm (Surpised!)

In this painting, a tiger, normally an object of fear, is shown as itself fearful of the violence of a tropical storm. You can see that the trees strain under the weight of the wind and the power of the rain is clearly felt.
